

One or Many Animals

Creating Plurals

Domain:

Reading and Language, Math

<u>Goals:</u>

- Child will identify pictured object and sight word.
- Child will identify the letter "s."
- Child will name the beginning letter and ending letter of a sight word.
- Child will find the letter "s" at the end of a sight word.
- Child will distinguish the difference between words with and without an "s" at the end.
- Child will understand the concept of plural as meaning more than one of the named object.
- Child will understand the concept of using the letter "s" to make that word plural.
- Child will count objects pictured on cards.
- Child will understand the math concept of just one or more than one.

Materials:

- One or Many Object Cards
- card stock or durable paper
- color CD
- scissors
- lamination

Instructions:

- Print One or Many Object Cards from color CD.
- Cut One or Many Object Cards along dotted lines.
- Laminate for durability.
- Present a set of two pictures (use the bear cards).
- Encourage the child to identify the pictured objects.
- Review the printed sight word beneath each object.
- Emphasize the beginning letter in each word.
- Point out the ending letter in each word.
- Find the word that ends with an "s."
- Introduce the concept of "plural" by discussing the fact that adding the letter "s" to the original word means that there is more than one of the object.







- Teach the concept of one or many by asking the child to count the object or objects on each card and then comparing both cards.
- Review the fact that the card with many objects also has the sight word that ends with the letter "s."
- Repeat the process using another set of cards.


For children who are ready for the "unruly" plurals:


- For the card with the word "fox," discuss the fact that with words that end with an "x," "es" is added to make the word plural.
- For the card with the word deer, discuss the fact that some words are used for both singular and plural (moose, fish).
- For some words like "goose" the "oo" is changed to "ee" to make the word plural (goose, geese; foot, feet; tooth, teeth).
- For the card with the word "mouse" state that the plural is "mice." Some plurals are completely different spellings.


Suggestions:


 Use only a few sets of cards when children are just beginning to recognize letters. Choose very familiar words from the story.

















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
